








# To generate knowledge *about/with* marginalized identities

"We can know about a world by describing it from the outside. Yet to understand what living in this world means, we need to learn from the inside" (Charmaz 2004: 980)





#### Lets try it!

- All sentences has to begin with "I feel excluded when…" (round 1) and "I feel included when…" (round 2).
- You do *not* have to write the whole sentence every time

Writing rules:

- Choose an experience you can remember from your life where you have felt ex/included.
  - Write as an 'I'.
  - Write what happened without using adjectives (silly, fun, amazing, smart)
  - Try to think if there is a thing, an object in this memory, and give it some attention (a cup of coffee, a kitchen, a school yard).
